

Living a Legacy of Love: Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday By Rev. Ann Lyter

As WE APPROACH the month of February, we find ourselves in a unique convergence of two significant days on the calendar: Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday. While they may seem unrelated at first glance, these two occasions provide us with a profound opportunity to reflect on love, repentance, and the legacy we are building in our lives.

The Intersection of Love and Repentance

I remember fondly how as a kid, our elementary school classroom was decorated with hearts and paper doilies, and we gave Valentines to every classmate with incredibly cheesy sentiments like, a bear saying, "I'd be *beary* happy if you'd be mine!" Over time, Valentine's Day became more about romance and celebrating the relationships that bring meaning to our lives. However, this year, Valentine's Day shares the date with Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the Lenten season.

Ash Wednesday, in contrast, marks a time of introspection and repentance. We receive ashes on our foreheads as a reminder of our mortality and the need to turn back to God. It's a day when we acknowledge our imperfections and seek forgiveness and spiritual renewal and marks the start of Lent, a time for introspection and spiritual growth in preparation for Easter.

The juxtaposition of these two days invites us to consider the intersection of love and repentance in our faith journey.

Embracing Lent as a Season of Reflection

Let us use this Lent to reflect on our relationship with God. Do we love God with all of who we are, or as Luke says it, "with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, with all your mind?" Or are there times when, like Peter, we lose our faith and sink into the water, or deny Jesus, or react in anger and take a sword to someone, rather than love them as ourselves? Are there areas in our lives where we need to turn back to Him? Are there ways we can deepen our faith and commitment to living out His love in the world?

Love as Stewardship

Stewardship is a concept deeply rooted in our faith. It encompasses more than just financial giving; it involves the responsible and loving management of all the blessings God has entrusted to us. This includes our time, talents, and resources. On Valentine's Day, we often express love through gifts and gestures, but what if we also viewed love as a form of stewardship? Loving God is the greatest commandment, said Jesus, but the second is like it, "love your neighbor as yourself." Love again.

Loving others is a way of sharing God's love with the world. It's a demonstration of our faith in action. Acts of kindness, compassion, and service are all expressions of love that can be a part of our legacy. As we celebrate Valentine's Day, let us challenge ourselves to extend love beyond our immediate circles and into our community. Consider reaching out to neighbors, volunteering, or simply offering a listening ear to someone in need.

Join Us on the Journey

As a day celebrating love, and a day acknowledging our need for God's love converge, let us remember both as we enter into Lent on February 14th. I hope you will join us for one of our two Ash Wednesday services to receive ashes, and commit ourselves to a season of spiritual growth. Engage in acts of love and kindness within and outside our congregation, knowing that these actions are part of your legacy as a faithful servant of God.

May this February be a month of deeper connections, renewed faith, and a legacy of love that shines brightly in our lives and community.



Lent and Easter Worship Series

THIS LENT, we are focusing on the life and faith of one of Jesus' most famous disciples. In Peter, we see a person who is both steadfast and unsteady, a dear friend and a betrayer, a follower and a wanderer. In Peter, we often see ourselves. By following Peter's journey, we watch the story of Jesus unfold through the eyes of a very normal human trying to figure it all out just like us.

Like many of us, Peter has a wandering heart. His journey is not polished, or linear, or perfect, but he is always tethered to the love of God. When you look closely at Peter's story, you find Jesus at each step along the way—offering him abundance, catching him when he begins to sink, challenging him when he stands in the way, washing his feet, predicting his betrayal, and offering him agapē love.

As we were studying Peter's faith journey, the lyrics of "Come Thou Fount" came to mind. It's as if Peter himself wrote this song. And so, for each step in Peter's journey, we have a phrase from this hymn. As we follow Peter's story, we will sing our way through Lent, binding our wandering hearts to God. We affirm that faith is a constant journey of steadfast pursuit, one that ebbs and flows. We will learn that wandering is exploration, not necessarily distance from God. We celebrate the ways Peter keeps going: he drops his nets, he walks on water, he runs to the empty tomb, he swims to the shore to meet the risen Christ. He keeps searching and yearning and loving, even after missteps or mistakes.

This Lent, we're joining Peter in figuring out faith. We're not idolizing or vilifying him; instead, we're hoping to wander alongside him, open to what we might learn about Jesus (and ourselves) by stepping in his shoes. Ultimately, in Peter's story, we are reminded that God loves imperfect people—in fact, time and again, that's precisely who God claims and calls. We will look for ourselves in the stepping stones of Peter's story. We will reflect on the stages of our own faith journeys as well as who and what has shaped us along the way.

There are several pieces to this journey:

Daily Devotional Cards—Beginning with Ash Wednesday and extending into April, there are cards for each day. Each card includes a centering practice for each week, a question or questions to think about, and a prayer.

Lenten Devotional Booklet—These booklets include poetry, scripture, commentary, artwork, and reflection for each week in Lent and two weeks in Easter.

Wednesday Online Meditation—Our Wednesday meditation will also be connected with Peter's journey as we share in a *Visio Divina* Bible Study. *Visio Divina*, Latin for "divine seeing," is a method of meditation, reflection, and prayer through a process of intentional seeing. We will use images created for this worship series and inspired by Peter's story.

Worship—The heart of our Wandering Heart worship series, we begin with Ash Wednesday.

ROBERT MACNEIL, the former anchor of PBS NewsHour, introduced the story of his own grandson, Nick, who has Autism, in a special series called "Autism Now." Families with children with Autism experience sacrifices that go beyond imagination, involving not only parents but also other family members. Nick's mother, MacNeil's daughter, received the diagnosis of Autism for Nick when he was 16 months old. Since then, she has dedicated almost all her time and energy to Nick. After work, Nick's father, Dave, takes him out to I cannot forget the story of a family that appeared on The Oprah Winfrey Show. The family, consisting only of three daughters, went camping. The father set up and organized the tent and then went fishing. The three daughters were playing inside the SUV parked in front of the tent. The mother was sitting next to the tent when suddenly the SUV started moving. The car was parked on a slightly sloped area, and it turned out the handbrake was not engaged. At the end of the slope, there was a flowing river.

play for an hour or two, riding the bus back home. Children with autism tend to engage in such repetitive behaviors.

The scene of Robert MacNeil talking with his 10-year-old granddaughter, Nick's sister, is still vivid in my eyes from a PBS series I watched about ten years

ago. The grandfather asks his granddaughter, "How do you think it would have been if Nick didn't exist?"

She responds, "It costs too much money because of Nick. A lot of money goes into things like vitamins and doctor appointments for Nick." The 10-year-old speaks articulately, saying, "It's so unfair. So many unexpected things happen at home. That's why it's so difficult."

The 10-year-old expresses the challenges, unfairness, and unease she faces due to having a sibling with Autism. However, I was able to feel compassion, love, and sacrifice for her brother in her words and expressions. Sacrificing for someone, sharing in their pain and suffering, and embracing that pain as your own — this is love. It epitomizes the greatest love, as articulated in John 15:13, "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends."



The mother instinctively tried to get up and stop the car but couldn't. The youngest was two years old, and all the children were quite helpless. Panicking inside the car, they didn't know what to do. The mother instinctively stood in front of the car, trying to slow it down with her arms. However, the car's speed

increased, and the mother, strained with all her strength, was pulled under the car. Fortunately, the car hit a small tree just before falling into the river. She was taken to the hospital with severe spinal injuries, and after numerous surgeries, she could barely sit in a wheelchair.

The daughters handle almost all the tasks at home. Dad only takes care of the most challenging ones when he comes home from work. They don't complain, seemingly unaware of the difficulties. Oprah Winfrey asked the youngest child, a 6-yearold, about her mother. She responds, 'Mom tried to die for me. Mom saved me. That's why I love Mom.'

Jesus died for us, shedding his blood on the cross when there was no other option. That's how much he loves us. So, when I think of Jesus, I cannot help but love Him.



February 9 (Friday) last day for getting a large item picked up. Call David and leave a message being sure to include name and phone number. Call before February 9, if you want a pickup by February 9.

February 13 (Tuesday) Pre-Sale Meeting for all workers, 10 a.m. in Moore Hall.

February 16 (Friday) Last day to drop off items.

February 12-16 is for workers only and workers can buy.

February 19 (Monday) Help is needed getting the tents up. Once the tents are up, we need many people to help empty the

pods, arrange items, clean, and price items for the sale.

February 19, 20, and 21 are workers only (no friends and/or family) and **there are no sales**. This gives the departments time to put finishing touches to their shelves and/or racks prior to the sale opening. Help is also needed on these dates with cleaning and arranging and pricing items coming out of the pods.



February 24 (Saturday) after the Sale. Help is needed in getting everything taken down and put back into the building.

February 26 (Monday) 75% off for workers only, with your badge on.

February 27 and 28 (Tuesday and

Wednesday) Gleaning by other organizations. They must bring their own boxes and bags and help to move their items out of the building. Departments may want to have workers in their areas to be sure that display items are not removed.

March 6 (Wednesday) After-Action Meeting, 10 a.m. Moore Hall

March 10 Pick ups resume. Call David for a pick up.

ON MONDAY, JANUARY 22, our food pantry volunteers had a terrible shock. Someone broke into our food pantry Sunday night by breaking a window, climbing through, cutting him/herself in the process, creating a

mess, and stealing about \$1,000 in food. It makes us sad because if they had just asked, we would have given them food. (That's literally what we do.) It makes us sad that anyone feels so desperate, so lost, or so disconnected that they turn to stealing, and stealing from the food pantry no less!

We ask you to pray for the workers who felt shock, dismay, and even violation, that someone would do this, when all the volunteers want to do is help.

We ask you to pray for the people who were so desperate or lost that they stole from us.

And we ask for your help to restock our food pantry so we can help our neighbors in need.

Winter Salad

Ingredients

1/2 C cider vinegar 1/2 C sugar 1/4 C vegetable oil 1 tsp salt 1/2 tsp pepper 1 can (1 lb) sauerkraut 1 med. onion, chopped 2 pimientos, chopped 1/2 tsp garlic salt 1 tsp celery seed

Directions

- 1. Combine first five ingredients in saucepan.
- 2. Bring to a boil, stirring to dissolve sugar.
- 3. Turn sauerkraut into strainer: rinse well with water.
- 4. Toss together the sauerkraut, onions, green peppers, pimientos, garlic salt and celery seed.
- 5. Pour the hot mixture over all and mix.
- 6. Chill at least several hours.

- From VRUMC's 1984 (20th Anniversary) church directory: "Mary Virginia Moore recollects this incident. At a special service on Ash Wednesday, the year before the All Saints Church on Recker Road was completed, a combined service of Catholics and Methodists was held. Some Methodist asked Father O'Grady to put ashes on their foreheads, and some Catholics asked Rev. Moore to do the same for them. Prior to completion of their building the Catholics held one mass and a Bible Study Class in the Velda Rose Church."
- In July 1967, Velda Rose UMC Ladies Society Cookbooks were sold for \$1.50.

 In 1967 it was announced that the carillon chimes were to be placed in the tower, "a gift to the church from one of our church families".








